## **Richland County Council Request of Action**

**Subject:** Award of Construction Services for Bonbon Lane Capital Improvement Project to the Most Responsive Bidder to be funded from the Department of Public Works Stormwater Management Division's FY08 Budget

### **A. Purpose**

County Council is requested to approve the award of construction services for Bonbon Lane capital improvement project to the most responsive bidder (pending bids on April 16, 2008 at 2:00p.m) to be funded from the Public Works Stormwater Management Division's FY08 budget.

### **B. Background / Discussion**

This project will consist of the improvement of approximately 1000 LF of an existing drainage ditch along Bonbon Lane in northern Richland County. The existing ditch traverses numerous residential backyards, is unlined, and is experiencing erosion. Runoff from the project enters a blue-line stream to Crane Creek and flows further to the Broad River. The purpose of the project is to alleviate erosion along the ditch. The total drainage area is 32 acres, requiring a 10 year storm event design criteria. As part of this project, varied sizes of High Density Poly Ethylene (HDPE) Pipe will be installed for the length of ditch (from 201 Bonbon Lane to 313 Bonbon Lane).

Right of Way Acquisition: The proposed project construction requires 10ft of permanent easement on either side of ditch from centre line of ditch (total 20ft) and an additional 10ft temporary easement on either side for construction (total 20ft). The current available easement widths are sufficient in accordance with above specified construction activity.

All of the necessary requirements applicable to the project (easements, permits, rights of way, utilities co-ordination, design and drawings, contract documents, specifications etc) have been satisfactorily addressed and/or completed. Bids were solicited for the project construction services from the qualified contractors on March 23, 2008 with a due date of April 16, 2008 at 2.00p.m. The received bids will be evaluated, and most responsive bidder along with the bid cost will be recommended to the Council in April 22, 2008 Council meeting.

### **C. Financial Impact**

The Engineer's estimated construction cost for the project is \$180,500. The Public Work's Stormwater Management Division has entire funding available for this project in FY 08 as per budget approved by Council. Council approval is needed in authorizing the award of contract to the most responsive bidder. It is to be noted that, the actual bids may come higher/lower than estimated cost of the project.

### A. Purpose

County Council is requested to approve the award of construction services for Stoops Creek Phase I & II capital improvement project to the most responsive bidder (pending bids on April 16, 2008 at 2:30p.m) to be funded from the Public Works Stormwater Management Divisio'sn FY08 budget/bond account.

### B. Background / Discussion

Phase I of the project is Stoops Creek and Piney Woods Road Culvert and Downstream Channel Improvements. It is Richland County's proactive measure for allowing positive uninhibited flow in Stoops Creek at Piney Woods Road Culvert. Phase II of the project is in response to Citizens service request/drainage concern along the southeast side of 4220 Donovan Drive (sinkhole proximity to the foundation). Phase two is Donavan/Roselle Drive Drainage Improvements. The principal features of this Contract include all necessary clearing, earthwork, construction, piping, erosion control, landscaping etc as specified in drawings to construct both Phase I & II of the project. The details of work is as below,

All of the necessary requirements applicable to the project (easements, permits, rights of way, utilities co-ordination, design and drawings, contract documents, specifications etc) have been satisfactorily addressed and/or completed. Bids were solicited for the project construction services from the qualified contractors on March 23, 2008 with a due date of April 16, 2008 at 2.30p.m. The received bids will be evaluated, and most responsive bidder along with the bid cost will be recommended to the Council in the April 22, 2008 Council meeting.

## **Richland County Council Request of Action**

**Subject:** Approval of Memorandum of Understanding between Richland County and Clemson University for Partnership in Environmental Program (Carolina Clear Program), for the benefit of Stormwater Management Division NPDES Permit Requirements

### **A. Purpose**

County Council is requested to approve the Memorandum of Understanding (attached) between Richland County and Clemson University Co-operative Extension Service for the Partnership in Environmental Program (Carolina Clear), and authorize County Administrator to sign the agreement on behalf of Richland County. The program benefits Richland County's Citizens in water quality restoration efforts and there by protecting environment. This program benefits Stormwater Management Division of Department of Public Works in complying with Stormwater quality Federal Permit Requirements.

### **B. Background / Discussion**

Richland County is under second five year National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) permits (Phase I & II), federal permits to govern stormwater quality. The permit is effective through September 10, 2011. This reissued permit also covers two Co-Permittees, the Town of Arcadia Lakes and City of Forest Acres, for NPDES Phase II regulations. As part of the implementation of the permit Richland County performs:

1. Public Education and Outreach
2. Public Participation and Involvement

With in-house capabilities, minimum measures are being implemented for the above two items. Clemson University Co-operative Extension Service with its strong expertise in these kinds of programs has developed Carolina Clear Program to inform and educate communities about water quality issues. They are grouping efforts in South Carolina region by forming partnerships, there by reducing costs in developing these programs. Lexington County is one of the Public Entity in the region which is on board with this program and City of Columbia is considering being part of it. The program on many occasions was endorsed by DHEC for its excellent unified approach and annual reporting. More details about the Carolina Clear program can be found on Clemson's website at <http://carolinaclear.clemson.edu/>. Richland County in its revised stormwater Management plan notified DHEC that Richland County will work towards partnership with this excellent resourceful program before Sept 11, 2008. The scope of work includes generating TV ads, radio ads, youth involvement programs, publications on behalf of Richland County etc and will be finalized once an agreement is official.

### **C. Financial Impact**

The costs involved in the Carolina Clear Program are \$56,000.00 per annum. The break down of costs is shown below. The Public Work's Stormwater Management Division has

funding available for this project in FY 08 Council approved budget. Council approval is needed authorizing Richland County to enter into contract since the program is multi year program (five year and automatic renewal for like term if not cancelled). The agreement has provisions for both the Public Entities to walk out of the agreement, if not attuned to the program at any time. Clemson University proposed performing the work with below costs.

It will save front end costs in developing TV ads, radio ads etc. Above all, the program and its annual reporting will aid in Richland County NPDES compliance and our annual reporting to SCDHEC.
2. Do not approve the recommendations, and send it back to the Department of Public Works. **Consequences:** Expect only minimum measures to be done since personnel, resources and expertise is limited. Anticipate delays. More front end costs in developing the program.

# Memorandum of Understanding

between

**CLEMSON UNIVERSITY**

and

WHEREAS, Clemson University (hereinafter, CLEMSON) possesses in its Extension faculty and staff various levels of expertise concerning stormwater compliance requirements as promulgated by SC DHEC and USEPA, and

WHEREAS, \_\_\_\_\_ (City/County) (hereinafter \_\_\_\_\_ (City/County)) is desirous of obtaining access to education and public awareness of stormwater; and

WHEREAS, Clemson University has developed an environmental program (Carolina Clear), portions of which apply to the impact of stormwater on natural resources;

THEREFORE, be it resolved that since one of the goals of the Carolina Clear program is to educate people about the impacts of stormwater and since this program provides educational opportunities to address a broad range of water quality issues including the impact of stormwater on natural resources, Clemson and \_\_\_\_\_ (City/County) will collaborate to address stormwater education. Carolina Clear is a comprehensive approach developed by Clemson University Cooperative Extension Service to inform and educate communities about, among other issues, water quality, water quantity and the cumulative effects of stormwater. Carolina Clear addresses the special significance of South Carolina's water resources and the role these resources play in the state's economy, environmental health, and overall quality of life.

In order to help \_\_\_\_\_ (City/County) satisfy the Public Education and Outreach Minimum Control Measure as required by the EPA Phase II Storm Water Program, the Clemson University Cooperative Extension Service (CUCES) proposes to utilize selected components of the Carolina Clear program in order to

- Implement a public education program to distribute education materials to \_\_\_\_\_ (City/County), or conduct equivalent outreach activities about the impacts of stormwater and the steps that can be taken to reduce storm water pollution; and
- Determine the appropriate public awareness campaign with \_\_\_\_\_ (City/County). Some program implementation approaches, BMPs (i.e., the

program actions/activities), and measurable goals are contained in the individual agreement and seek to

- Form partnerships,
- Use education materials and strategies, and
- Reach diverse audiences.

In order to satisfy the Public Participation/Involvement Minimum Control Measure, the Clemson Cooperative Extension Service proposes to

- When asked and as appropriate, assist local entities with complying with applicable local public notice requirements,
- Provide program accountability measures which provide feedback and reporting data to include number of people contacted, publications produced and distributed, and other specifics as appropriate, and
- Other programs and measures as specified in the Contractual Agreement.

Because each agreement is unique to the requirements of the circumstances, Clemson and \_\_\_\_\_ (City/County) agree that the specific metrics of each contract shall be individually negotiated and delineated in the Contractual Agreement. Neither party has any responsibility for any performance obligations except as indicated in a subsequently negotiated Contractual Agreement.

This Memorandum of Understanding will commence upon the date of the signature of the last party to this contract and will run thereafter for a period of five (5) years from the date of the last signature. The parties may agree in writing to extend this agreement for an additional 5-year period, provided such agreement is executed no later than 30 days prior to the expiration of this contract. No amendments, changes or modifications will be effective until and unless reduced to writing and signed by the parties. Either party may cancel this agreement upon the giving of 30 days written notice.

## Richland County Council Request of Action

**Subject:** Utilities Department Office Space

### **A. Purpose**

The purpose of this report is to obtain County Council approval to purchase an existing office building to house the Utilities Department Administration and Engineering Divisions.

### **B. Background**

The Utilities Department's Administration and Engineering Divisions are currently located at 3506 Fernandina Road in Columbia. This building, which is located in Lexington County, has been leased by the Utilities Department since 1999. The existing office building has approximately 3700 square feet of office space and has been outgrown by the Department. Currently there are several offices with double occupancy and even employees within hallways

A search for additional office space found an existing office building at 7525 Broad River Road for sale. This building is the former office of the Southland Log Home Mortgage Company. The building was originally designed and constructed to house an engineering firm. The land area is approximately one acre and includes a 6300 square foot single-user 1.5 story office building that was built in 1985. Thirty-six parking spaces exist with an entrance off the Broad River Road adjacent to the Ballentine Exit on I-26. The building is located in Richland County and is within the Broad River Sewer System service area.

### **C. Discussion**

The building at 7525 Broad river Road can be purchased for approximately \$700,000.00. That price is approximately \$25,000.00 less than the appraised value. The County Administrator, Finance Department and Utilities Department have developed a plan that would fund the purchase of this property. A loan from the general fund's fund balance would be made to the Utilities Department. The loan would be repaid over an established period from the revenues generated by the operations of the utility systems. These revenues are totally user generated and no general tax revenue would be required.

The Utilities Department currently pays an annual lease of \$63,600.00 for its office space.

### **D. Financial Impact**

The funding plan developed by Administration, Finance and Utilities would require a loan from the general fund to the Utilities Department enterprise fund. This loan would be repaid over time from revenue generated by users of the utility systems. No general fund tax revenue would be required to purchase this building.

During the FY 08-09 budget process a Utilities Department budget will be recommended with funds included for partial repayment of the loan. Each subsequent year will also include these funds until the loan is repaid.

**E. Alternatives**

1. Approve the purchase of the building with the funding plan developed by Administration.
2. Approve the purchase of the building with an alternate funding plan.
3. Disapprove the purchase of the building.

The attachment is consist of two estimates. First one is an estimate of costs that R. Pearson supplied to CTC in a letter dated 9/1/04.

The second spreadsheet is my update to those costs. Of note is the \$374,000 figure for the County's portion of improvements to Hobart, west of the RR track and a portion of the work within the RR crossing.

To generate this update, I simply compared what we provided in our budget in 2004 costs of paving One mile (\$500,000) to current numbers supplied for this fiscal year 2009 budget (\$1,000,000).

In reviewing the documents it appears there was an intricate negotiation to establish who paid for what, and given the increase in the costs it may again be subject to negotiation.

The breakdown in responsibility for the work was as follows:  
Developer to construct road from RR to the east  
County to construct Road from RR to the west  
RR crossing- Joint cost share.
